NATURAL SCIENCE AIN'T WHAT IT USED TO BE... OR IS IT?

I never thought that I would be interested in politics. I mean childhood was spent up in the trees with mockingbirds and sour plums, sloshing through tide pools, following endless animal tracks and searching under rocks for garter snakes, turtles and frogs. Adult life isn't much different. I inwardly chuckled when the supervisor of my first wildlife research job said that politics is an important force in every biologists life, in fact, in the life of every living creature. He meant not only the internal politics of my particular agency, but the broader, nebulous world of "governments". So along with the natural science, I began to notice the political science of my environment.

For me politics is still mostly nebulous, but I recently found a point of focus. The Audubon ligislative phone tree has been activated twice during the past week. Bigfork members were asked to telephone Rep. Ray Brandewie and ask him to vote no on HB 379 which pertains to private wildlife management areas. The bill was defeated and Ray did vote no! Thanks Ray! Meanwhile, Kalispell folks were notified to contact Sen. Matt Himsl asking him to support SB 329, to amend the Natural Areas Act of 1974. That bill passed! And Himsl did change his vote to one of support.

We love you, Matt!

To get a message to your representative, telephone 1-444-4800 and leave your brief message with one of the friendly operators. You can find out the voting result by calling 1-800-237-5879. The voting record of your representative can be obtained from the County Clerk and Recorder a few days later.

If you were not contacted this time around on the phone tree, we hope to get you next time. If you're not interested in participating, just tell your contact person and we'll cross you off the phone tree list. But remember, one of these legislative issues

may be an important force in your life.

### Montana – Audubon Legislative Fund

There is a lot of news this month from the Audubon Legislative effort in Helena. After the Feb. 25 deadline for transmittal of bills there will still be lots of lobbying to do but only a couple initial hearings on Audubon issues. There have been many successes so far, but your continued support is essential to maintain these gains. Keep those calls and letters coming! Here are the details:

- SB 177 Sponsors Sen. Yellowtail and Rep. Sands. The Nongame Wildlife Checkoff. Passed the Senate with an amendment. As it stands now, the checkoff will be reinstated without a sunset clause, the Nongame program will be supplemented by license fee money subject to appropriations, and the Dept. of Revenue will be allowed to assess up to \$1 per donation for administrative costs. Audubon supports.
- MB 266 Sponsor Rep. Ream. Clarifies the process for endangered species nominations. Passed the House, Audubon supports.
- HB 329 Sponsor Rep. Ream. Restitution for illegally taking wildlife. Passed the House, Audubon supports.
- IIB 298 Sponsor Rep. Rapp-Svrcek. Allowing a hunter to take only one grizzly per lifetime. Passed the House, Audubon supports.
- HB 431 Sponsor Rep. Phillips. Allowing houndsmen to hunt lynx. Passed the House, Audubon OPPOSES.
- HB 526 Sponsor Rep. Schye. Increase in hunting license fees to protect wildlife habitat. Not out of committee at press time.

  Audubon supports.
- Sponsor Rep. Iverson. Subdivision reform. Closes the loopholes in the old law and makes the review process more predictable for developers. The new law would include review for critical wildlife and riparian habitat. Hearing before transmittal.

  Audubon supports.
- SB 329 Sponsors Sen. Blaylock and Rep. Bradley. Natural Areas Act. Hearing Feb. 20. Audubon supports.
- HB 781 Sponsor Rep. Cohen. Forest Watershed Management Act.

  Audubon supports. Howard and the Audubon Supports.
- Funding for Natural Resource Information System and Montana Natural
  Heritage Program: Rep. Keenan will introduce a bill soon for
  The Realty Transfer Tax\*that will provide long-term funding for
- these programs as well as for county planning. Audubon supports. Parks funding: Audubon has testified against several raids on the coal tax trust for state parks.
- Environmental protection: Audubon has testified against several industry efforts to weaken the MT. Environmental Protection Act, the Major Facility Siting Act, and air quality standards.

Call the Legislative information number for the status of these bills, or call the Audubon lobbyists for more background information. Calls and letters from a legislator's home district are very effective. Let your representatives know they are being watched.
